> Gideon – 100 men routed the army of the Midianites.

Barak – 10,000 men defeated King Jabin of Canaan w/his 900 iron chariots.

Samson – killed more Philistines in his death than his life.

Jephthah – a small band of men routed the Ammonites.

<u>The Three Accomplishments</u>:

 Conquered territories/took possession of the land (Judges).
 David and Samuel enacted God's righteousness.
 Obtained the good things that God had promised to Abraham (land, nationhood, growth, prosperity).

The Three Threats Overcome by Faith:

1. Predators (animal world).

2. Destructive power of the natural world (fire).

3. Deadly weapons of political powers.

The Three Divine Invigorations:

1. Empowerment in weakness (Samson).

2. Prowess in warfare (Gideon).

3. Victory over foreign armies (David).

The Tenth and Last Item:

Not a gift received by men, but by women on account of their faith!

+ Resurrection of a family member
- The widow of Zarephath (Elijah)
- The woman of Shunem (Elisha)
- The widow of Nain (Jesus (Prophet))

People who Suffered Through Faith (v.35b)

The Preacher now shifts the focus of the congregation to those who suffered <u>through faith</u>, which bore a greater witness of God than by accomplishments.

+ The Preacher may be referring to Eleazar and an unnamed mother who refused to eat pork dedicated to the Greek god Dionysus (cf. 2 Macc 6:7, 18 – 7:42). People who Suffered Through Faith (v.36)

Here the congregation would have possibly thought of the mistreatment of Joseph (Gen. 39:20); the prophets Hanani (2 Chr. 16:7-10), Micaiah (1 Kings 22:26, 27), and Jeremiah (Jer. 20:2, 7; 29:26; 37:15-16), as well as the persecution of Christians in their era.

People who Suffered Through Faith (v.37a-c)

God's faithful people were also put to death, executed, in very brutal ways. + Naboth (Stoning - 1 Kings 21) + Zechariah (Stoning - 2 Chr. 24: 20-21) + Stephen (Stoning - Acts 7:58) + Those sawn in half in an attempt to prevent resurrection (Isaiah (?)) + Sword/Beheadings (James) (Acts 12:2)

People who Suffered Through Faith (vv.37d-38)

God's faithful people were also excluded from civil society.

+ Forced to live as vagrants
- No clothing/food/shelter
- Wore sheepskins/goatskins
+ Forced to wander (no livelihood)
+ Forced to live in caves & holes

People who Suffered Through Faith (vv.37d-38)

Because of the world's treatment of God's saints, the world is not worthy of them. And, thereby, unworthy of God; hence, He will pour out His judgment upon them!

People who Suffered Through Faith (vv.39-40)

"Through their Faith" in God's faithfulness all the **Old Testament saints** were attested by God as reliable witnesses to the LORD!



People who Suffered Through Faith (vv.39-40)

In life and death, prosperity and adversity, in victory and persecution, the LORD vindicated them for their <u>faith</u>!



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People who Suffered Through Faith (v.39-40)

40"God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect apart from us."

By our Lord's work on His cross through His death and exaltation, He now make others complete through the cleansing of the conscience (9:9, 14; 10:1, 14) in antication of the resurrection when all people (OT and NT saints) will be made complete in everlasting life in the heavenly Zion (12:22-24).
