I. Preconditions for the Race (v.1a-b)

- A. Support from the cloud of witnesses for the congregation in its race (1a).
- B. Congregation's removal of all impediment to progress (1b).
- II. Character of the Race (vv.1c-2)
 - A. The appeal to run together persistently as a team of athletes in the race (1c).
 - **B.** Running with persistence focusing on Jesus, the founder and finisher of the race (2).
 - 1. Jesus, the founder of the race and the model for endurance by His death on the cross (2a).
 - 2. Jesus, the finisher of the race with His work as Priest and King (2b)



The Preacher now builds a bridge from his previous examples of faith to exhort the congregation to focus their attention to the race set before them. + He does this through verbal repetition. - "so then"; "for that reason" - The use of "seeing"; "looking"

THE AUTHOR AND FINISHER OF OUR FAITH

AUTHOR AND FINISHER OF OUR FAITH Jesus, His personal Name, emphasizes His humanity. He, the obedient man, by His life and death opened the way to the Father's presence (cf. 10:20).

AUTHOR AND FINISHER OF OUR FAITH

He is the Author of the race! Jesus is the founder and content of faith. He is the One who ran the race to the end (cf. 2:10).

AUTHOR AND FINISHER OF OUR FAITH


He is the Finisher of the race. He is NOT a forerunner, but the ongoing source of your eternal salvation for all who obey Him (cf. 5:9).

AUTHOR NISHER OF OUR FAITH

Perfected by His sacrificial death, your Great High Priest perfects you; by bringing you to the finish line (10:14); and strengthening you with His Body and His Blood.

So in running the race of faith you depend on Jesus from beginning to end. Just as every good gift comes from God through Jesus, so you come to God through Jesus (7:25).
