 - > Phobethomen = an aorist subjunctive
 - Cautious prudence that foresees and avoids negative consequences!

For good news came to us just as to them, but the message they heard did not benefit them, because they were not united by faith with those who listened.

- + "Good News" the Gospel of His promise.
- + "to us just as to them" Gospel is for all!
- + "did not benefit them, because..."
 - ++The Israelites received no profit or help from the Gospel message due to their lack of faith and unity with the believing!



For he has somewhere spoken of the seventh day in this way: "And God rested on the seventh day from all his works." And again in this passage he said, "They shall not enter my rest."

Here the preacher brings to mind the Jewish practice of reciting Gen 2:1-3 within the synagogue after speaking Ps 95!

- So God rested after His work to provide for His people a time/place to rest in Him.
- For you, this means His time/place is His Son in His Kingdom!

For he has somewhere spoken of the seventh day in this way: "And God rested on the seventh day from all his works." And again in this passage he said, "They shall not enter my rest."

So we can conclude with the words of the preacher, "They shall not enter my rest."

- Those who will not enter His rest are those who refuse to believe in Jesus Christ as their LORD and Savior.
- As did the Israelites, they disqualify themselves, due to their lack of or no faith in Jesus, the Good News!
