The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) "The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ..."

+ This phrase is the opening of Revelation. In the time of John, this was seen as being sufficient to indicate the content of a scroll (book).

+ In the Greek, it literally means that the revelation is of and from Jesus Christ. And as we are told, this revelation was given to Him, by the Father; Jesus then gave the revelation to His angel, to His servant John, to the seven Churches, to all Christians.

The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) **"The Brief Commentary (vv. 1-3)"**

+ It's also important for us to know HOW this revelation was given: "... *He made it known*..." or literally, He gave the revelation in word and with visuals.

- Not only was God's Word revealed to John's mind, but John saw the signs and wonders in visual form. It's as if John was watching an ancient motion picture and writing a commentary on what he saw.

The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) "...through His angel..."

+ The source is the Father and Jesus as the Mediator. Our Lord gives His revelation through His angel.

+ You will come to see that angels play a very important role throughout this book. They assist John with interpretation of visions and they, notably, keep John's focus on what's important in regard to each vision as they answer his questions (and ours!).

The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) **"Blessed is the one reading aloud and the**

+ Notice pecial blessing to the one who reads alouce plaims) and the ones HEARING this book. Receiver is the only book of the Bible so singlect prith such a unique blessing, although Scriptur pes clear that reading and gs blessings. study of <u>all</u> Scriptur Originally, this text w. ten for the purpose of the pastor reading (r ing) and the congregation hearing! The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) **The Divine Confirmation (vv.4-6)**



+ While John's name self-consciously does not appear in any of his other books; here it appears twice (vv.1, 4; also 1:9, 21:2, 22:8), leaving no question to the fact that the book is Apostolic.



The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) "...from the One Who Is and Who Was and Who Is Coming..." (v.4)

+ Let's review Exodus 3:14.

- Therefore, this is the Greek literary form of the Tetragrammon, or the Holy Name of God, YHWH (I AM).

- The entire three-part phrase is really a rendition of the Holy Name of God by John, which has rabbinic. roots.

The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) "...and from the seven Spirits..." (v.4)

+ Notice that the seven Spirits have the same authority as God the Father and Jesus Christ.
- Therefore, this is clearly a reference to the Holy Spirit. (cf. Isaiah 11:1-3)

- The number 7 symbolizes God in His perfection, completion, and holiness. This number, therefore, is very prominent in Revelation.

The Apocalypse of Jesus Christ Prologue (1:1-8) The Lord's Return (vv. 7, 8) + The Prologue concludes with a reference to our returning Lord Jesus. - Mt. 26:64; 1 Thess. 4:17) + "Behold..." occurs 27 times in Revelation and serves to draw our attention to an especially

important point. The coming of Christ will be personal and visible, seen by all at once.

+ V.8: This isn't Christ, giving testimony of Himself, rather it's His Father! Just as He spoke at His Son's Baptism and Transfiguration, the Father gives His eternal confirmation of His Son and the words of Revelation. He then signs His doxology,
