THE CONTEXT

In Heb 5:11 – 6:20, the preacher now shifts from Old Testament exposition to exhortation. Thus, the preacher interrupts himself from teaching about Jesus, The High Priest; to personally addressing the congregation. His goal is to motivate them so that they will listen to God and what He has to say to and about them!



THE CONTEXT

We will see that the preacher's argument gives way to a personal and emotional appeal to the congregation!

He does not scold them; rather, the preacher explains to them positive and negative reasons why they <u>must</u> listen to God!



THE CONTEXT

The preacher appeals to their sense of shame! This we see today in our text...

Then he changes his method from shame to fear in 6:4-8 and then to hope in 6:9-20.



This pericope is filled with educational terminology; consequently, the preacher is using the catechetical method of the apostolic church.

He will use two valuable sources to teach the congregation:

- 1. The oracles of God (5:12), and;
- 2. The Word of Christ (6:1)



The preacher begins his teaching by admitting that God's decree about Jesus as The High Priest (cf. Ps. 110:4) is "profound" [still much to say] and "difficult to explain."



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THE TEACHING

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What's the result?

Since the congregation has become slothful, this leads to them being mentally and spiritually immature.

No Growth



They should actually be teachers of the faith, but instead they have lost what they have had...discernment!

So, they must be "re-catechized!" They need to re-learn the foundational teachings of the faith that are listed in the following verses (6:1b-2).



THE TE&CHING 5:13-14

These two verses contrast the congregation with those who hear the Word of God (adults); with those who can hear, but can't/won't understand (infants)!

The goal is to lead a disciple from elementary education (milk) to "the Word of righteousness" (solid food).



Let's review Ephesians 4:14, 15

Receives God's Word

Assimilates God's Word

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THE TE&CHING 5:13-14

The essential nourishment, the Word of righteousness, will produce three important necessities:

2. The training of the senses!
Their power of moral and spiritual perception. So what they hear, they know is Truth. That leads them to hear, see, taste, and touch via their involvement in Divine Service!



THE TE&CHING 5:13-14

The essential nourishment, the Word of righteousness, will produce three important necessities:

3. Through God's training in the Word of righteousness, they can distinguish between what is good and what is bad!



6:1-2

The preacher now changes from a detached exhortation; to joining with the congregation in exhorting "us" to accomplish three actions!

1. They all, including the preacher, needs to leave the foundational teaching of Christ as The High Priest and build on via advanced instruction!



THE TEACHING 6:1-2

2. All are invited "to go on to perfection." This is the goal of their instruction...spiritual adulthood!

3. With God leading them, they will be able to fix six building blocks on the "foundational teachings of the OT and the teachings of Jesus!"

As you can see this structure is in "Catechetical Order!" In the Greek, it's poetic and designed to be memorized!

6:3

This verse is a "commitment" verse! The preacher is exhorting the congregation "...this we will do!"

Yet, there is a caveat! Only if God will permit it! The congregation is to depend on the Lord to carry them along in their educational journey to the completion of their liturgical, spiritual formation!



SUMMARY

This part of the sermon shows that the practice of catechesis was an established tradition in the first-century Church! The purpose of instruction was to prepare the adult candidates for Holy Baptism.

Together, with the Rite of Holy Baptism, catechesis laid the foundation for the Life of Faith!
