NOTE ON PARTICIPATING IN THE LORD'S SUPPER

As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church throughout history, Closed Communion is observed by this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those who:

(a) are baptized in the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit;

(b) have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scriptures as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, have been confirmed in and are a faithful member of a congregation of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod or a denomination that has altar fellowship with the LC-MS, and continues to embrace this same Lutheran faith in the same way that it is believed, taught, confessed, and practiced at this congregation;

(c) believe that in this Sacrament Christ Jesus is truly present (The Real Presence) in, with, and under the bread and wine which is the Real Body and Blood of Christ that is distributed to and orally received by you, bestowing on you the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation;

(d) that you have truly examined yourself and have repented of all your sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this Holy Meal.

If you are a guest at Shepherd of the Springs Lutheran Church, we kindly ask that you first speak with our pastor before receiving this Blessed Sacrament. It is in accord with Holy Scripture that we practice Closed Communion and, therefore, it is an expression of our sincere friendship and concern for your spiritual welfare. If you desire to learn more about our beliefs we ask you to speak with our pastor.

St. Peter and St. Paul, Apostles

As Jesus took up His cross, so did St. Peter and St. Paul. Jesus in our stead; Peter and Paul for our benefit. Peter and Paul gained their courage and fortitude to face death only because they took to heart the death of Christ for them. When Jesus first told His disciples that He must suffer, Peter—who had just confessed, *You are the Christ*—could not accept it. He had not yet learned that Jesus had to suffer many things, nor to take up his own cross and follow. Thus he denied Him thrice. But what Peter had learned of Christ's suffering, then he, and Paul, and every martyr, could take up their own cross—in Peter's case, quite literally.

It is through much tribulation that faith learns well what it cost our Lord to earn salvation, and how very precious is His Holy Gospel. When Christians suffer for Christ, accepting their lot for His sake, suffering willingly rather than compromise themselves against His truth, it means they have learned the lessons of St. Peter and St. Paul. Both refused to renounce Him, knowing what a disgrace the Church would otherwise have suffered, and what eternal blessings Christ had earned for her, His dear Bride!
