NOTE ON PARTICIPATING IN THE LORD'S SUPPER

As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church throughout history, Closed Communion is observed by this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those who:

- (a) are baptized in the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit;
- (b) have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scriptures as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, have been confirmed in and are a faithful member of a congregation of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod or a synod that has altar fellowship with the LC-MS, and continues to embrace this same Lutheran faith in the same way that it is believed, taught, confessed, and practiced at this congregation;
- (c) believe that in this Sacrament Christ Jesus is truly present (The Real Presence) in, with, and under the bread and wine which is the Real Body and Blood of Christ that is distributed to and orally received by you, bestowing on you the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation;
- (d) that you have truly examined yourself and have repented of all your sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this Holy Meal.

If you are a guest at Shepherd of the Springs Lutheran Church, we kindly ask that you first speak with our pastor before receiving this Blessed Sacrament. It is in accord with Holy Scripture that we practice Closed Communion and, therefore, it is an expression of our sincere friendship and concern for your spiritual welfare. If you desire to learn more about our beliefs we ask you to speak with our pastor.

FESTIVAL OF THE REFORMATION

Today, we commemorate the Lutheran Reformation accomplished through the work of Dr. Martin Luther (1483-1546). The Order of Divine Service reproduced in this Divine Service Guide is an adapted version of an early Lutheran mass ("messe" means "communion service") written by Luther, the Deutsche Messe (German Mass) of 1526.

On October 31, 1517, Luther, a professor at the University of Wittenberg, posted 95 Theses onto the Castle Church door in a desire to debate the Roman Catholic practice of "indulgences" (selling pardons from sin's punishment). The goal of Luther and his coworkers was that the Gospel be preached so that sinners could have peace with God. The Roman system of indulgences and good works left people in doubt about their status with God; the gospel—that Jesus takes away our sins freely—crushes doubt! Among the many reforms that followed was Luther's German Mass of 1526. Luther's aim was to create a worship form that involved the laity and taught them the truth of the Gospel. Thus, the congregation was given the role of singing many parts of the service that had previously been reserved for monastic choirs and the clergy. Luther also removed parts of the Roman mass which reflected unscriptural thinking and customs. Our celebration today will follow Luther's Messe (yet, in English!).

Verbum Domini (Dei) Manet in Aeternum

"The Word of the Lord Endures Forever"

This phrase, and the symbol printed on the front cover of this guide, is based on 1 Peter 1:24-25. It became the axiom of the Lutheran Reformation. It was first used by Elector Frederick the Wise in 1522. He ordered that a similar likeness be sown onto the right sleeve of the court's official clothing. Frederick's successors, John the Steadfast and John Frederick the Magnanimous, continued the tradition. It later was adopted as the official maxim of the Smalcaldic League, an alliance of Lutheran territories created to defend Lutheran lands.
